Key issues arising:

- The Minister welcomed the group, set out the background to the APJ process and invited each
 of the Enterprise Ireland client companies to outline the top 5 issues for their business and the
 priorities for the Action Plan for Jobs 2017 to further support job creation. This was followed by
 a general discussion.
- Addressing skills needs is one of the main priorities for the group to support job creation.
 Among the key issues raised were the need for a greater focus on developing "work ready" graduates; expanding the skills pool particularly in sectors where there are skills shortages (e.g. ICT, fintech); shorter, more intensive training courses (3-6 months) to address particular skills needs (e.g. coding, data management); and prioritising middle management training. Recent developments to increase apprenticeships are welcome but greater awareness of the employment opportunities, particularly among parents is required.
- Measures to mitigate the likely impact of Brexit on exporters were discussed these included supports for enterprise to improve productivity (e.g. Lean) and to diversify into new markets, and measures to control business costs and reduce the administrative burden.
- The group also highlighted the need for more investment in infrastructure to support our growing economy – priorities include the delivery of high speed broadband, high quality mobile phone coverage, improved road connectivity between our main regional centres and addressing congestion in our cities.
- Other issues raised include the role of local authorities in addressing local barriers to enterprise investment and facilitating enterprise and jobs growth; developing alternative sources of

finance and ensuring the cost of credit is competitive relative to EU competitor countries; and facilitating SME access to public procurement opportunities. Consideration needs to be given to developing reference sites.
